Bi-Annual President's Letter

Summer in the Sawtooths is once again upon us. For what seems like the first summer in many years the Valley is (thankfully) not inundated with smoke from nearby fires. And, as always, summer is a busy time for those working with and within the Sawtooth Society to protect, preserve, and enhance the Sawtooth National Recreation Area. The last year has been an eventful one for the Sawtooth Society.

In February Greg Travelstead was promoted from Stewardship Coordinator to Executive Director of the Society. Greg has continued to perform the tasks of Stewardship Coordinator while also assuming the role and responsibilities of Executive Director. Greg has a deep love and respect for the Sawtooth NRA. Under his guidance the Sawtooth Society continues to grow the number of 'boots on the ground' personnel to clear trails and perform multiple maintenance tasks for the Forest Service to enable the ever-growing population of hikers and bikers to enjoy the trails within the Sawtooth NRA with minimal environmental impact. The Society is currently well ahead of its goals for trail clearing for the year. We look to continue to grow our direct impact on the Sawtooth NRA under Greg's steady hand for years to come.



The Sawtooth Society continues to work with the Forest Service and landowners to improve the scenic values within the Sawtooth NRA. This emphasis is embedded in the Society's DNA and will always be an area of major importance to us. After several years of effort, the Sawtooth Society and the Forest Service have jointly printed and released a new booklet titled "Building Within the Sawtooth National Recreation Area – What Works" which can be found on the Society's website at http://www.sawtoothsociety.org/Assets/Private Lands Brochure.pdf . The primary goal of this document is to assist those new to the Valley in understanding what we 'should do' when building to continue to keep the private lands within the Sawtooth NRA in the condition envisioned by the authors of Public Law 92-400 that created the Sawtooth NRA. The Society and the Forest Service held a joint public forum at Idaho Rocky Mountain Ranch in early June to present and discuss the new document. It is obvious when driving through the Valley that those who own property and homes here truly love this special place. Our hats go off to everyone who does their part in continuing to keep the private lands within the Sawtooth NRA beautiful.

Another area of continued success for the Sawtooth Society is the administration of grants from Idaho Goat License Plate funds (under an agreement with Idaho Parks & Recreation) to assist other organizations in their efforts to improve the Sawtooth NRA. The Society typically has \$40,000 to \$50,000 per year available from this program to provide to sister organizations. These funds 'pass through' the Sawtooth Society to other organizations without any administrative fees from the Society.

I believe that the Sawtooth Society's mission to protect, preserve, and enhance the Sawtooth Recreation Area continues to be a vital one. Executive Director's Update

It's an honor and privilege to be reporting our progress in preserving, protecting and enhancing the Sawtooth NRA as your new Executive Director. While I remain close to the Stewardship role, and have been blessed to spend many days on projects with our tremendous volunteers this season, I am fully engaged on the policy and advocacy issues so ably navigated by Gary O'Malley over his many years of service to the Society and the Sawtooth NRA. Gary continues as our Director of the Sagebrush Soiree. I hope to meet as many of you as possible there – a grand evening of socializing and supporting our work.

After years of work with the Forest Service, we've jointly drafted and published a revision of the Private Lands literature. It was presented in a public forum in June at Idaho Rocky Mountain Ranch, to introduce the changes and the pamphlet. A panel of FS subject matter experts was joined by our own Board member Wes Wills and Custer County Planning Department head Christy Foster, to field questions from the public after introducing the context and changes to the guidance. The result is a recommendations document entitled "What Works", which emphasizes that many of the suggestions are important, but often voluntary. The interplay between regulations and agency preferences has been clarified. The revised document is available for viewing or download on both our web page and that of the Sawtooth National Forest. We will remain vigilant about inappropriate development issues in the Sawtooth NRA.

Gary has also passed me the baton on the Sawtooth Valley Fire Collaborative, which is being facilitated by Stanley Mayor Steve Botti. I had occasion in late June to tour the Cape Horn area, where the initial phases of active prevention measures are under-way on the Salmon-Challis National Forest, and where the Sawtooth NF intends to commence its share of the prevention later this fall. These measures include awarding logging contracts, forest thinning, and prescribed burning. The collaborative was instrumental in the two national forests receiving over \$2 million in additional funding specifically for the work identified by the collaborative. This phase of the work will take 3-4 seasons. With the Fire Collaborative's learning curve now flattening, we hope that additional phases, and additional funding, will result for our ongoing efforts.

The Sawtooth NRA is now officially part of the Gold-Certified Central Idaho Dark Sky Reserve, the first in America. I have already met visiting amateur astronomers this sum-mer who were drawn specifically because of this designation. For more information, please visit http://www.idahodarksky. org/. 
