

A Letter to Members From Our President

Dear Friends and Fellow Society Members,

2012 is a special year marking the 40th anniversary of the Sawtooth National Recreation Area's creation and 15th anniversary of the Society's founding. Since inception, the Society has served as the Sawtooth NRA's primary public advocate:

- Working with state and federal policy makers on issues critical to the Sawtooth NRA;
- Helping negotiate and fund conservation easements protecting open lands and scenic vistas;
- Investing over \$600,000 in 150 recreational-related projects and programs; and
- Sponsoring and conducting educational programs reaching over 2,000 people yearly.

But even as we celebrate these milestones and achievements, serious challenges remain. Growing visitor numbers and increasingly diverse recreational activities are testing the area's capacity; property sales are inviting increased development; and state and federal agency funding cuts are significantly eroding area management resources. Absent greater private sector involvement, meeting these challenges will be very difficult.

In response, over the last year the Sawtooth Society leadership has carefully considered these challenges and its own future. We spent considerable time reflecting on what the future vision of the organization should be and how best to position the Society to continue

to play a positive role over the next decade. As a result of that review and numerous rich discussions, the Society recently took three important steps that I am excited to share with you. To more crisply and strategically focus Society activities, the Board adopted the following as the Society's future vision:

- Being an objective, credible provider of stewardship education with respect to the unique qualities and resources of the Sawtooth NRA;
- Being the most effective regional and national advocate for the Sawtooth NRA and public policies that affect it;
- Having a diverse and growing base of ongoing and long-term funding and member/partner collaborations to achieve its mission.

To fulfill this role, we are embarking on a major multi-year outreach effort, combining traditional techniques and new social networking technology, designed to engage and educate 10,000 or more annually on Sawtooth NRA values and opportunities to help ensure this special place remains so. These are people who can be educated and recruited as volunteers for key projects, resource providers, and public advocates on Sawtooth NRA issues. As a part of this new initiative, the Board sanctioned an aggressive pursuit of the financial and other support needed for this effort.

I'm pleased to report that several Board members, as well as others, have committed significant financial and direct in-kind work to support the effort. A Communications Committee of the Board has developed a strategic communications plan and design work has begun on a new, interactive website, coupled with appropriate social networking tools and updated collateral marketing materials. A planned series of annual volunteer projects and educational forums will further engage and educate present and potential Society members. In addition, grant applications are pending with several institutional donor prospects to secure the necessary incremental resources to fully implement this work.

This is truly an ambitious undertaking! But in light of the challenges ahead, it is one we deem essential for continued protection of this place we all cherish. Commenting on national parks featured in his recent film series, Ken Burns said (with paraphrase): "Places like the Sawtooth NRA perform a kind of open-heart surgery on us, permitting us more room in our hearts for love of these places, for love of our country, for love of our family. We are all co-owners of these most moving places on Earth, and while much of our emotion is born in the spectacular scenery we are seeing there, it also finds its source in us and our love and connection to each other. It's a pretty amazing bargain, this Sawtooth NRA. As co-owners all we have to do is to use it wisely, make sure it is being preserved carefully, and pass it safely on to our posterity."

With your continued and growing support, the Society aims to help all of us do just that! Thank you for the privilege of helping lead this exciting work!

These are Busy Times at the Society

With the rolling out of our initiatives to enhance outreach to youth, increase our work with volunteers and to establish partnerships to increase our reach, there is a significant amount of fresh and exciting activity underway, including:

- Revamping our website to appeal to a broader audience and to become interactive and employ social media tools.
- Planning important volunteer efforts for this year and building a strategic plan to dramatically increase the number of these projects going forward.
- Designing and printing of a stunning, new Sawtooth Society brochure and related material to position the Society with potential new members.
- Implementing a "dollar-a-day" program with the Idaho Rocky Mountain Ranch, Redfish Lake Lodge and the High Country Inn to increase our visibility and membership with visitors to the area.
- Enhancing our presence by linking with 40th anniversary articles and the new hiking guide of the Sawtooth's by Matt Leidecker.
- Reaching out to foundations that support organizations similar to the Society and submitting applications for grants to implement our work.

We have also been very busy on our more traditional work, including:

- Building partnerships with other non-profits who share similar goals to leverage our work, including the Trust for Public Lands, Nature Conservancy, Conservation Fund and the Bill Lane Center at Stanford University.
- Meeting with the Idaho congressional delegation, key congressional committee staff and agency leadership to discuss our policy priorities.
- Striving to obtain the remaining necessary funding for the Rodeo Grounds conservation easement.
- Garnering support for the Stanley to Redfish Lake Trail.
- Rebuilding awareness and support for the exchange of state-owned parcels in the Sawtooth NRA necessitated by the transition of key state and federal agency personnel who have recently retired.
- Establishing support for donor recognition where the Society provides grants to enhance recreation.
- Participating in the development of an Idaho Public Television special celebrating the 40th anniversary of the Sawtooth NRA.
- Seeking private funding to conserve key wetland parcels.
- Encouraging private landowners and the U.S. Forest Service to find "win/win" solutions to long-standing issues to both protect Sawtooth NRA values and private property rights.
- Managing the "goat" license plate funding and working to complete a long-term renewal for our partnership with the State of Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation.
- Exploring new ways to partner with government agencies to accomplish more work on the ground.
- And planning a world-class party for July 28th the Sagebrush Soiree!

Sawtooth Society Grants Continue to Benefit Stanley and the Sawtooth NRA

The Sawtooth Society continues to invest in the Sawtooth NRA's recreational experiences and with these recent grants has now approved nearly 150 grants within the Sawtooth National Recreation Area. The vast majority of these grants have been made possible by the proceeds from the popular mountain goat license plate. Over the last six months the Sawtooth Society has approved the following grants:

- Scenic Byway signage at Sawtooth NRA entrance portals
- Improved trailhead signs at various locations in the Sawtooth NRA
- Wilderness invasive weed treatment at campsites and along trails
- Pioneer Park playground equipment for families, visitors and residents alike
- National Smokejumper volunteer projects, including fencing
- Two AmeriCorps volunteers to help with interpretive programs, including those at the Redfish Visitors Center

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Vision 20/20 Community Update

On June 4th the Sawtooth Society helped sponsor a Community Update and dinner in Stanley on the Sawtooth Vision 20/20 program, with over 60 people attending. Sawtooth Vision 20/20 is a long-term strategic plan to help identify risks to Sawtooth NRA and put in place collaborative strategies to address these risks and other opportunities.

The program provided an update on a wide range of items including: the Pole Creek Off Highway Vehicle Project which is expected to be completed this year, the proposed substantial expansion of summer trails in the Galena Summit area, planning underway for the Stanley to Redfish Lake trail, new portal entrances for the Sawtooth NRA, the new website work for the Sawtooth NRA and updates on the wolverine study and the geothermal study for Stanley. Best of all, the formal program was followed by a potluck dinner which further enabled conversations among the many groups directly engaged in Sawtooth Vision 20/20.

The steering committee will continue to meet throughout the coming months to ensure progress against goals is maintained and to plan for a thorough stakeholder review of this work in 2013.
